

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to serve the people of Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share an update on issues important to Maine and America.

One of my priorities for 2023 has been to improve the appropriations process in Congress – the way it decides how to spend taxpayer money. I took over as the Vice Chair of the Senate Appropriations Committee last year. Along with Chair Patty Murray, we decided the best change we could make was not to do something new. Instead, it was to do something old – that is, go back to the regular and transparent committee process that we used to have.

Part of restoring this process included holding 50 public Committee hearings, which allowed for input from senators on both sides of the aisle. As a result, for the first time in five years, the Senate Appropriations Committee passed all twelve of its funding bills on time. This was done with strong bipartisan support. In fact, seven of them passed unanimously.

Now, we need to work with the House of Representatives to pass these twelve bills and turn them into laws.

These bills contain funding for a wide range of Maine priorities, including support for the workforce at Bath Iron Works and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, our lobster industry, infrastructure improvements, affordable housing, biomedical research, veterans, and heating assistance programs like LIHEAP. These bills also contain nearly \$590 million in Congressionally Directed Spending for 231 projects throughout the State of Maine. These projects would help promote job creation, expand access to health care, and improve public safety, infrastructure, and important resources in communities across all 16 counties of our state. I will continue to work to get these bills signed into law in the new year.

On October 25, the horrific mass shooting in Lewiston claimed the lives of 18 Mainers and injured 13 others. In response, I led Maine's Congressional Delegation in requesting an independent investigation by the U.S. Army Inspector General into the events leading up to the shooting. On December 15, the Under Secretary of the Army wrote to inform me that such an investigation will take place, and the Army Inspector General has instructed her team to immediately begin preparing to conduct this investigation. While nothing can undo the events of October 25, I will continue to work to understand what happened and what could have been done differently, and to find answers for the victims, survivors, and their families.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and this year I honored that work ethic when I cast my 8,855th consecutive roll call vote.

As we look ahead to 2024, I remain committed to addressing the concerns of Maine families and communities. If you need assistance or wish to share your thoughts, please do not hesitate to reach out to one of my six state offices.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. It's an honor to continue serving as your representative in Congress, and I take the responsibility very seriously. I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I've been working on behalf of the people of the Second Congressional District.

Maine's heritage industries are the backbone of our state's economy. That is why one of the first bills I introduced in this Congress was the *Northeast Fisheries Heritage Protection Act*, which would prohibit commercial offshore wind energy development in Lobster Management Area 1 (LMA 1) in the Gulf of Maine. LMA 1 was identified by the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM) as a potential commercial offshore wind site. LMA 1 is a critical and highly productive fishing ground for a variety of sea life, including lobster. Prohibiting offshore wind development in LMA 1 would help to avoid conflict with the New England commercial and recreational fishing industries. Additionally, the bill would initiate a federal study on the environmental review processes of any relevant Federal agencies for offshore wind projects in the Gulf of Maine.

I also continue to advocate on behalf of our veterans and those providing care to our former service members. The current pay for VA employees in the Kennebec and Penobscot counties does not reflect the critical services they are providing. As the oldest state in the nation, with the fifth highest veteran population, Mainers rely on the services offered at the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) facilities. That's why recently, Senator Collins, Senator King, Representative Pingree, and I called on the Biden Administration to increase locality pay for VA employees in Kennebec and Penobscot counties. The level of care received is impacted by job vacancies, and the high turnover rate among its healthcare workforce is often the result of pay and compensation issues, which is further exacerbated by the increased cost of living.

Lastly, I'm excited that Mainers are continuing to reap the benefits of the *Bipartisan Infrastructure Law* (BIL). Recently, millions of dollars in grants have been awarded across the state, including \$35 million through the U.S. Department of Transportation's Culvert Aquatic Organism Passage (AOP) program to conserve spawning and migratory habitats for native fish species in Maine, \$460,000 through the Airport Infrastructure Grant (AIG) program for the Princeton Municipal Airport, Stephen A. Bean Municipal Airport, and Dexter Regional Airport, and nearly \$8 million through the Buses and Bus Facilities Program for Bangor's bus system. These investments are critical to ensuring Maine's infrastructure and will help to ensure Mainers and businesses across Maine are connected.

Regardless of the year, one of my top priorities is ensuring I'm accessible to you. My staff and I can help answer questions about and navigate federal programs; find resources in Maine; and resolve issues with Medicare, Social Security, the VA, and other federal agencies and programs. Dear Friends and Neighbors:

I want to thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve you in the Maine Senate. It has been an honor to work on your behalf to make our state an even better place to live, work, and conduct business. I am grateful you have put your trust in me, and I will continue to work tirelessly on behalf of the people of Senate District 4.

The First Regular and First Special Sessions of the 131st Maine State Legislature were notable as there were over 2,600 legislative bill requests and 2,019 of them were officially printed as Legislative Documents (LDs). No legislature this century has had as many LDs printed during its first year.

One area of success was in the Highway Fund. In the past, the Highway Fund has been supported through gasoline taxes, which have been declining for years due to more fuel-efficient and electric/hybrid vehicles, and bonding. However, we now have created a sustainable source of funding to maintain our transportation infrastructure. This is done by dedicating 40% of the vehicle sales tax and the sales and use taxes collected by the Bureau of Motor Vehicles. It is predicted to raise more than \$200 million for infrastructure each biennium.

The Second Regular Session began on January 3rd of this year. I am eager to discuss the issues important to all of you. I have heard from many of you regarding the biggest concerns you are facing, including the protection of Maine's natural resources, increased costs of everyday items, access to health care and child care, education, housing, inflation, child welfare, mental health and substance abuse, workforce development, and crime, among others. I will continue to do all I can to advocate for your priorities in Augusta.

Again, thank you for electing me to serve you in the State Senate. The 131st Legislature has a great deal more work to do. However, I believe that if we work collaboratively, there is nothing we can't accomplish. Dear Friends & Neighbors:

May you and your families enjoy a healthy and prosperous 2024! With lawmakers gathering in Augusta for their Second Regular Session on January 3, I am continually grateful for the opportunity to serve my constituents. If you are ever in need of assistance with respect to State Government, please do not hesitate to contact me.

In addition to the hundreds of bills carried over for further consideration from the First Regular and First Special Sessions of the 131st Legislature, more than 100 new measures have been accepted by the Legislative Council for deliberation over the coming months leading up to the statutory adjournment date of April 17. Amongst these various bill titles are "An Act to Exempt Motor Vehicles of Active Duty Service Members Stationed Out-of-state from Excise Tax," "An Act to Utilize Career and Technical Education Centers in the Development of the Electrician Workforce," and "Resolve, to Establish a Pilot Project to Alleviate the Crisis in the Offices of Regional Child Protective Services." Moreover, the Governor, in her State of the State Address, laid out several proposals that will require much deliberation and scrutiny, including storm recovery funds, allocations for emergency and permanent housing, the workload of child protection caseworkers, and background checks on all advertised private sales of firearms.

State finances will, of course, be a major topic of discussion, as well. A \$265 million surplus will prompt debate on whether to spend more on additional programs, or return this excess to its source – you the taxpayers. This projection could potentially increase following the next meeting of the Revenue Forecasting Committee. Rest assured, with goods and services still costing extensively more, I am committed to providing meaningful tax relief to help fellow Mainers make ends meet.

In closing, I again wish to thank you for allowing me to be your voice at the State House. Be sure to follow legislative proceedings as they unfold via the Legislature's Web site, https://legislature.maine.gov/. By staying informed, you will be empowered with the ability to make good decisions and respond effectively.

Dear Citizens of Guilford Maine:

As we start the new year, I wanted to take a moment to reflect on the past year and summarize the progress we made as a community.

We faced many challenges in 2023 but we are confident that the decisions and investments that we made will result in significant strides towards a better future. The struggles we faced as a town last year are the same that many communities across the state and the nation are grappling with. The need for housing, for trained employees, for employers all top the list. Higher energy costs, supply chain issues, and changes with our industries have made budgeting difficult. Our focus every day has been on finding solutions to these problems and on creating new development opportunities for Guilford.

We have witnessed investment in several longstanding companies including our local grocer (Eli's Market) and our long-time furniture store (Davis Brothers Furniture). Hardwood Products, continues to re-invest in their Guilford facility and remains focused on their long term growth in the community. Robinsons has completed the reconstruction and expansion of its convenience store and fuel station at the intersection. Androscoggin Bank has opened a business office at the CH Lightbody Municipal Center. The Piscataquis Country Club has been revitalizing and reorganizing their facility. We are excited for their bright future and continued success.

We made progress in our efforts to improve Guilford's infrastructure. A major road project is being planned to improve Sebec Shore Road, Wharff Road, Guilford Center Road and High Street. This will be an extensive project, and a major investment in our local roads. Should the citizens vote to approve the financing necessary to complete this work, construction could begin this year.

We have initiated work on our town's Comprehensive Plan. This will help create a roadmap that focuses our efforts toward our common goals. Creating and passing a plan has been a long term goal for the town. The process, in collaboration with Eastern Maine Development Corporation, will take approximately a year. We expect to complete the plan in 2024 and will present it for approval at the next annual town meeting.

Our property tax revaluation remains underway. We were hoping that all would be completed and in place by April 1st of this year. However, the process has taken longer than we anticipated. Our highest priority is to ensure that it is fair, accurate and equitable. Once completed, we want to allow plenty of time to let you, the taxpayers, see your new valuation and have an opportunity to ask questions, prior to tax commitment. We are expecting the revaluation to be completed in 2024. Many of you have had the opportunity to meet Joe Salley, who is conducting the revaluation for us. If you have any questions about the process or the status, please reach out to the town office and we can put you in touch with him.

In January of this year, we formed a collaboration with Androscoggin Bank, Eastern Maine Development Corporation, Piscataquis County Economic Development Corporation, and the Piscataquis County Chamber of Commerce. The purpose of this combined effort is to bring services to the area that are not currently in place, aimed at developing and creating business and commerce opportunities. The town



office has provided meeting and office space to facilitate this collaboration and there are innovative things happening that will stimulate our local economy and make Guilford a thriving community.

Early in 2023 we applied for a Remote Worker grant that would create a space in our town library for remote employees and entrepreneurs to work from. We were thrilled to learn that we were awarded \$100,000 to help us accomplish this goal. This project is underway, and we plan to have an open house once it is complete. I would encourage anyone who has not visited our town library in recent years to take the opportunity to see all the hard work that has been done to this town treasure. Our mobile library project also kicked off this past summer. This project is in its early stages, but we are working toward providing library services to people that cannot easily get to us and to rekindle some excitement for reading. We are looking forward to watching the program grow and become what we have envisioned.

We also applied for a marketing grant through the Maine Tourism Marketing Partnership Program in the fall of 2023 and received a \$30,000 grant for our annual River Festival. With the help of these funds, we plan to make Riverfest bigger and better! Our hope is to make our event a destination for people from all over the state. Some of the plans in place are to add high quality vendors who specialize in Maine made crafts, local artisans who will do on site demonstrations of their work in progress.

We are excited to host the Vietnam Memorial Traveling Wall this year from July 2^{nd} through July 6^{th} . This Traveling Memorial stands as a reminder of the great sacrifices made during the Vietnam War. It was made for the purpose of helping heal and rekindle friendships and to allow people the opportunity to visit loved ones in their hometown who otherwise may not be able to make the trip to Washington. Guilford is the only place in Maine where the wall will appear this year and we were happy to learn that we were on the schedule for July 4^{th} weekend when many people are visiting the area. We are honored to host this tribute and are grateful for our local businesses and organizations who have donated to help make it happen. We hope that everyone will have the opportunity to see the wall in person and remember those that sacrificed so much for our protection.

In the coming year we have plans to partner with area employers and to utilize grant funds to develop more substantive technical training and workforce development programs as well as digital access to training. As always, we are ready to assist our local employers' should they need our help. As we move forward into 2024, let us continue to work together to make Guilford a better place for all of us to live, work, and raise our families.

Lastly, I would like to thank all the town employees and volunteers who worked tirelessly to make these accomplishments possible. Without your dedication and hard work, we would not have been able to achieve so much. Thank you to the Selectboard for your continued support and dedication to our town. Finally, a special thank you goes to Nancy Lappert, she has been behind the scenes in so many ways and has spent countless hours volunteering her time for the town. Nancy is one of the most enthusiastic and energetic people I know. Thank you, Nancy!!

Our new computer system is not new anymore and we have worked out most of the glitches...Although some days it tricks us and gives us a new challenge that we haven't handled before. Typically, it waits for those right before tax time. Thanks for always being understanding and patient with us when we are dealing with technical difficulties.

This year brings the second presidential election that I will oversee. I like to joke that when I started here, I came on after an election where there had only been about 109 people that had come out and voted. Since I have been here the numbers have been over 300 every election. This makes me very happy to see people expressing their freedom to vote and I don't expect this year to be any different so please come out to vote. If you have any questions about voting, please call and we can chat ahead of time. Absentee voting is always an option.

2023 GUILFORD FIRE CHIEF REPORT

Greetings fellow citizens,

Here we are with another year behind us. 2023 was a challenging year for me personally. I started the year with surgery for prostate cancer in January and ended the year with shoulder surgery in November for a torn rotator cuff. As of my most recent blood test last month the results are showing at levels considered undetectable, which is very good news. Currently I am still going through physical therapy for my shoulder. All is going as expected with my shoulder recovery, but progress is slow. A special thank you to my wife who tended to my needs at home through my recoveries. Through all of this I am proud to say that the crew here at the fire station has done a great job in covering calls and tending to tasks around the station. I can't thank them enough. I'm very proud to serve with them and look forward to what the future holds.

We have been involved with the creation of run cards for the Sheriff's Office to use that contain pre-determined information about which departments get called to help us in a mutual aid capacity. This effort has been county wide. We are trying to streamline the task of getting fire trucks and crews on the road quickly while reducing the amount of radio traffic. The cards have 1st, 2nd and 3rd alarms mainly for building fires but also for chimney fires and wildland fires. Each level has departments listed for response to the incident on hand whether it be to respond directly to the scene, standby by at our station for coverage or stand by at their own station in anticipation of the next level of run card being paged out by the Sheriff's Office. The run cards are set up for Guilford, Abbot, Parkman and Kingsbury. Each set of run cards is unique to the area being covered and trying to utilize the departments that make the most sense geographically. There is still a lot of work to be done and I'm sure we will find issues with what seemed to work well on paper but not so well when put into action. Overall, I'm excited to see this move forward as I think it will make responding to calls much more efficient.

We are also working on the accountability system for our members. Each member has a tag with their name on it and the fire department initials. We have an accountability board which we plan on mounting on a stand so it can be used at scenes to track what each member of our department is tasked with for a job and who they are working with. This is a very important part of any scene but especially on a building fire scene where there are multiple departments on scene and the need for accounting of each person is of utmost importance.

We are looking at different ideas on how to better utilize the space we have at the fire station. There is a lack of equipment storage. We end up with items stored around the perimeter of the truck bays. I'm not sure what the plan is at this point, but the officers and I will be discussing it further in the year to come. We have also had a couple roof leaks. One in the old town office space and the other in the old truck bay. I haven't researched the age of the roofing material on this section of the building but intend to look at quotes to see what we are up against for replacement or repair.

We still have some openings in the roster and are always interested in bringing new people on board. Currently, a lot of the crew works out of town during the day which doesn't leave many members in town to cover calls. If there is any interest out there in the community to join the fire department, please come talk to us. It is a great opportunity to work with a great bunch of people and serve your community.

On the topic of safety, I am remined of a recent chimney fire we responded to. We found the chimney was plugged from the bottom up to a level that was above the exhaust pipe for the oil-fired furnace in the basement. There was a wood stove on the first floor which produced most of the residue that was plugging the chimney. This prevented the exhaust from the furnace from exiting the building through the chimney. Therefore, the exhaust was forced back into the basement which created a dangerous buildup of CO gas. Thankfully there was enough of a draft through the old foundation which allowed the gas to dissipate. I stressed the importance of CO detectors to the homeowners. I would caution everyone to be mindful of not only having working smoke detectors in your homes but also CO detection as well. It is the silent killer as the CO gas is odorless and tasteless. Please be safe with your heating appliances.

Thank you once again for allowing me this opportunity to serve you as your fire chief.

PUBLIC WORKS SUPERVISORY ROADS REPORTS

Road Foreman's Report

Striping

We now own our own striping equipment and stencils. This allows us to do our crosswalks, parking lots and any type of required stencil work. What we paid for contracted line work last year paid for all the equipment we needed. This year savings will be \$5000 + by owning our own equipment.

Culverts

We replaced or reset nine culverts on Pleasant Street to prepare for paving.

Ditching

Due to an abundance our ditching was contained to Pleasant street in preparation of paving.

Paving

We shimmed and overlaid Pleasant Street, Morse Ave and Prospect Street. We came in right on budget. The paving work was done by Pike Paving and the hand work for crossings and driveways was performed by Roundy's Paving out of Newport.

Road Study:

We continue to follow our road study we had done a few years ago. We continue to make progress to bring better road conditions to all. Some of the projects ahead will be costly and require more work. We will continue to mix large and smaller projects together to improve in and out of town roads. Please be patient as your road is on our list.

Winter Roads:

Well, what a different year we are having. Unlike last year when it started out as snow, changed to rain and a quick freeze type of winter. This year it's been a lack of snow, warmer weather, and smaller storms. Every year is different which require different methods to treat and clear roads. We have used salt on town parking lot and some town roads compared to past years salt/sand treatments. We've spent a lot of time scrapping roads compared to plowing roads.

PUBLIC WORKS SUPERVISORY ROADS REPORTS

Town Projects

We finished the fence at the playground by installing wire along the roadside cedar fence. We built a new sitting area, installed a new bulletin board and sitting bench at the post office. We excavated and built a wall in front of the library. This was a seven-day project that ran into a lot of hidden piping. Both outside wall wings run out instead of in. This is due to piping behind the wall that could not be relocated. The left-hand wing has piping behind it. This wing is removable due to a future drainage project. We painted all the parking lot lines and crosswalks with our new line painter. This will save the town five figures in just a few years. We also designed and installed a safety railing on the back side of the library building.

Future Projects

Paving is always at the top. How much can we do? How much is liquid asphalt selling for? This chances just like gasoline. How much can we do with what we have for funds? We have several infrastructure projects in town we are looking into. We are looking at cemetery roads to improve drivability. We applied for funding to replace four failing cross culverts on the Sebec Shores Road. This project is much too large for us to do and will involve the Army Corps of Engineers & Dirigo Engineering to design.

Playground

We are experiencing a lot of vandalism in the playground. Painting, writing on equipment, breaking some of the equipment and tearing the back fence down. The tennis court net was cut this past year and bike marks all over the court. Please if you notice anything from people to writings on equipment give us a call.

The summer of 2023 saw the revaluation project continue. Many of the properties in town have been visited by the revaluation team of assessors. The team still has properties to visit and will continue the visits once the weather is more cooperative. The purpose for their visit is to measure the buildings on your property and make any updates to the condition of the buildings since the last revaluation. Thank you all for greeting the revaluation team of assessors kindly. They are also willing to answer any questions that property owners may have. The revaluation team has reported a warm welcome from the residents of Guilford, which is very much appreciated.

The real estate market in this area continues to be healthy with both an adequate volume of sales, and a healthy appreciation of selling prices.

The Property Tax Stabilization for Senior Citizens program was in effect for the 2023 tax year, and many taxpayers were able to benefit from the program. Next year this program will not operate locally through property tax. Homeowners or renters who meet the requirements will be able to apply through the Property Tax Fairness Credit on the Maine individual income tax return. This credit is available to eligible Maine taxpayers whether they owe Maine income tax or not.

I would like to extend a sincere thank you to the taxpayers of Guilford for having me during the 2023-2024 calendar year and being so cooperative as I go about the annual assessing cycle. I look forward to continuing my service with the Town of Guilford in the coming year.

We, the library staff, volunteers, and board members want to thank everyone whose effort made 2023 a great year at GML!

Items of interest:

- GML is now open six days a week for a total of 44 hours in the summer and 35 during the winter.
- We currently have a total of 13,481 items available in-house for lending, including audiobooks, DVDs, and newly released books. We also have added to our large print collection and to our juvenile graphic novels.
- We provide a cloud-based library with e-books and audiobooks for borrowing.
- We use an inter-library loan system that allows borrowing from other libraries within the state.
- We subscribe to the Maine State Library's large print service for our visually impaired.
- GML has space for remote workers to use. Over the year we have been visited by remote workers, local and those visiting from other areas. We were told by our visitors that our library was a favorite. We applied for and received a generous Remote Workers Grant from the Maine State Library to improve work space and upgrade Tech to further support remote workers in the community.
- We offer printing, copying, and fax services, as well as free WiFi and computer usage.
- We have collaborated with Eastern Development Corporation with them placing an intern with us to learn job skills.
- Currently, we have 545 active patrons. Our patrons are a mix of year-round and seasonal patrons. In 2023 we circulated approx. 9846 items. Not including some inter-library loans.

• This year Sangerville residents were given access to our library through a collaboration with the Town of Sangerville.

Projects and programming:

Summer programming, including the bookmobile to expand our community reach, was a joint effort between Kaitlin and Kristin, allowed us to expand our collection, through a generous grant. Our summer reading program was busy with over 50 local children reading hundreds of books. Over the past year children worked on crafts, learned yoga with Bryanne, discussed books in various book groups, and participated with Penquis for a story time and two Front Porch Projects presentations. We partnered with The University of Maine Cooperative Extension's One Tomato program. Our library grew a productive tomato plant, which many patrons picked from. Our local children also learned about making tomato sauce from scratch in cooperation with Laurie Bowen of the University of Maine Cooperation Extension.

Kristin has tackled some technology projects and Kaitlin handled the 2022-2023 annual reports and has been updating our website and Facebook pages. Our volunteers Mandy and Kathy have helped with decoration, various organizational projects, and our weekly story time. Janice has helped updating and reorganizing our collections.

In cooperation with the Town of Guilford, we were able to install a Little Library in front of the library for the community to use. We were honored to have visits from local authors, Boo Walker, who visited our book club via Zoom, Shannon Bowring, and Kathy Pellitier who visited. David Slagger, A local Historian offered programming on local Native American history and Tim Caverly visited and entertained us with an Allagash Haunting. We have various seasonal programs such as an open house/ costume party for Halloween and an open house with cookie decorating and hot chocolate in December.

Many patrons have made monetary donations and books for our book sales, items which include books and DVDs, and in magazine donations for circulation use.

We at GML are very thankful for all who support us throughout the year!

To the Town of Guilford Residents,

On behalf of the Board of Directors of **your** Guilford Memorial Library I am pleased to share highlights from 2023 and plans for 2024.

If you have visited the library you have seen familiar faces and a few new faces on the staff and dedicated volunteers. Our Librarians tag team of K & K (Kristin & Kaitlin) provide expert and enthusiastic service to our patrons. Our volunteers, Mandy, Janice, Gayle and Kathy have been invaluable in maintaining programs and accessibility to patrons. One familiar face we certainly miss is Martha Maines, who for many years was our reliable substitute and most recently our weekly custodian.

On the outside you've undoubtedly noticed "the wall". The Town Crew did an amazing job building the structure with the assistance of the Guilford/Sangerville Water and Sanitation Districts. Who knew that the water and sewer pipes would need re-routing? We had ordered a beautiful black rod iron fence, only to learn that for public safety we needed to meet OSHA standards, so back to the drawing board and budget sheet! We are hopeful for a late spring installation of the fencing.

After many years of tirelessly tending the beautiful flower gardens, Dodie Curtis made the difficult decision to hand over their care to the town's gardeners. The gardens suffered over the summer, due to the excessive rain and lack of frequent attention. On a late September afternoon, Dodie, Gayle, Janie and Greg were joined by Eleda Wacker to clean up the gardens and prepare them for winter. We are pleased that Eleda has agreed to fulfill the job as the library gardener for 2024.

Our lovely Carnegie building has received upgrades in energy efficient lighting and updated electrical outlets. Security cameras have been placed strategically around the building, inside and out. Grant monies have provided funding for a small, functional kitchen area on the lower level complete with a sink, microwave and mini-fridge. Thanks to Robinson's True Value, Dustin Lander & Son Carpentry, Greg Lander, Crouse Plumbing, Washburn Electric and James Whittle for planning, ordering, delivering and installing each piece necessary to bring this long-awaited project to fruition.

With the closure of the Sangerville Library in late 2022 and the forethought of their Board, Sangerville residents are now eligible to receive privileges at GML via a special fund set up to pay the yearly fee. All students and staff of SAD#4 are entitled to free library privileges as well. We have been able to expand our hours to six days a week as we meet the needs of the increase in patron usage.

The staff was able to use one of the Town's grant-funded electric vehicles as our tiny bookmobile over the summer. With the return of the car to the State the outreach programs to Riverbend Homes in Guilford and Oakes Manor in Sangerville halted. We are researching ways to restart this important outreach program this spring. Though not a direct program of the GML, the three "Little Libraries" in town have had the books replenished by our librarians using donated books.

As I write this report our volunteers are busy creating personal Valentine cards for the residents at Riverbend Homes. After many years of chairing the annual Valentine's Tea, Dodie is step-

ping aside, handing the reins over to the capable Gayle Worden. Of course Nancy Lappert will be on hand to serve and entertain.

We are pleased with the variety of programs offered at the library, the increase of participation in town activities (Riverfest, Halloween and Christmas) and the overall positive atmosphere inside the building, portrayed on the website and shared on social media.

As Trustees, we are fortunate to be invited to seminars at the Maine State Library in Augusta, webinars on a variety of subjects and networking opportunities with other library trustees to keep us up-to-date on current trends, policies and future planning. Our policies are continually reviewed and our strategic plan will be reviewed and revised in May.

Our By-Laws recommend that three Honorary Trustees, for unlimited terms, be invited to attend special functions and programs when available. Our current Honorary Trustees are Barbara Reardon, Sheila Thompson and Bill Thompson; three very dedicated supporters of their hometown library.

Thank you for your continued support of the Guilford Memorial Library through your tax dollars, your patronage and your donations.

MID-MAINE SOLID WASTE ASSOCIATION

The towns of Dexter, Exeter, Ripley, St. Albans, and Corinna are members that form the Mid Maine Solid Waste Association (MMSWA). Additionally, non-member municipalities using our facility include Guilford (since 2004), Cambridge (since 1999) and on May 1st 2021 the town of Sangerville. The Association is governed by a Board of Directors, which represents the interests of each of the participating member communities.

The MMSWA facility provides for the disposal of solid waste at its Transfer Station and operates a Recycling Facility on the premises. The site also offers demolition debris disposal, composting, tire disposal, white goods (refrigerators, appliances, etc.), universal waste (televisions, monitors, etc.), and metal disposal.

During 2023 MMSWA disposed over 7,100 tons of MSW (municipal solid waste-household waste). 1,300 tons of wood waste (however 1000 tons was burned on-site), 800 tons of landfill debris, 125 tons of compost, 43 tons of universal waste, 10.5 tons of food waste, and over 900 tons of recyclables including 1500 gallons of paint. Because we process these items separately it is important for our residents to keep these items separated when bringing them in for disposal. MMSWA's recycling rate continues to hover around 40%, shy of the 50% mandated by the state. MMSWA strives to improve this percentage but needs the help of our patrons to accomplish this goal. Every year the cost of disposing household waste increases by 4 to 5%, so the more our residents recycle, the more each town's disposal fee increase can be minimized.

Please assist MMSWA in achieving its recycling goals by separating your trash prior to arriving at the facility. This allows our staff to maintain a clean, organized, and customer-friendly environment while increasing our recycling efforts. Remember, the more materials recycled, the less our waste disposal costs will increase in the future.

MMSWA is in an agreement with Municipal Resource Committee with 100 plus other towns to have our MSW go to the new state of the art recycling facility in Hampden. This facility will take the MSW and put it through a separator to maximize the recyclable product. The facility was opened in 2018 and has since been put on hold until there is a suitable buyer. In June 2023 Municipal Review Committee (MRC), a regional municipal solid waste management organization, and Innovative Resource Recovery (Innovative), a pioneering materials management company, are delighted to announce the signing of a landmark agreement to become co-owners of Municipal Waste Solutions' Hampden Facility. This collaboration marks a significant step forward in advancing sustainable waste management practices and promoting a circular economy in Maine. By bringing together the expertise and resources of MRC and Innovative, this partnership aims to enhance operational efficiencies, expand recycling capabilities, and further reduce the environmental impact of municipal solid waste.

We have a separate area for bulky waste which includes sheetrock, sofas, stuffed chairs, tarps, carpet, large plastic items such as toys, outside furniture etc. The bulky area is currently not in use but will pending the new startup of the facility in Hampden. Anyone not sure where items should be properly disposed, please feel free to ask for assistance. Wood waste will stay the same as the past three years. Our clean wood (brush and logs) will continue to be chipped and removed for recycled energy. Our demo wood will be burned on site with the ash shipped to a controlled landfill. We shipped 40 tons of ash to Hartland landfill in 2023 at a cost of \$4,385.

The budget to operate the facility in 2023 with the addition of Sangerville was \$1,329,180. This figure includes \$779.040.00 for household waste disposal and transportation and \$41,000 for landfill operations. We recovered \$130,000 with the sale of recyclable materials and saved \$98,000 in disposal costs as a result of recycled goods.


There is a fee schedule for certain items for disposal and copies of the schedule can be acquired from the transfer station or your town office. Rules for the use of the transfer station and recycling facility and vehicle permits are available at the transfer station or your town office. Please feel free to contact us at MMSWA 924-3650 if you have any questions. Current permits are required in order to use the MMSWA facility. Hours of operation are 8am to 5pm Monday-Thursday and Saturday. We are closed on Fridays and Sundays.

An important reminder, please make a concerted effort to secure all incoming loads in order to prevent road side debris.

Residents of Guilford,

It was a busy year for the Guilford – Sangerville Water District (GSWD) in 2023. The financial operations of the district went well; following this letter is a financial statement. Last year we had some water main breaks within the system but with help of local contractors we were able to get them under control and repaired promptly. We completed a small project last summer, the capping and disconnection of an older unneeded water main that runs along the riverwalk. This small project will help improve the health of our distribution system.

We have some ongoing projects as we move into 2024; the first being the Well #1 Replacement Project. With this project we are replacing the aging Well #1 installed in 1961 with a brand new drilled well with a submersible pump located out of the floodplain. This will help with keeping the system up to date and maintained for the future.

The second project is the completion of the Service Line Inventory as required by the Lead and Copper Rule of Drinking Water Program (DWP). It is going to be a very in-depth inventory of every service line within our system. This project is a new requirement for water districts nationwide. We have been working on this inventory all year using our system records. This year we will be visiting every household that didn't complete a service line info card that was included in the fourth quarter water bill of 2022. With that visit we are looking to see what material your service line is when it enters your house for the service line inventory database.

At this moment we are working on consolidating both the water and sanitary districts into a new district called the Guilford – Sangerville Utilities District (GSUD). A vote was held in November and was passed by both towns. Now that the vote is done, we are working on the long and detailed process of creating a new district and dissolving both water and sanitary districts into it. Overall, in the long run this will help us reduce costs and create a more solid district working as one.

The Board of Trustees would like to thank its employees for its dedication in providing its customers with a safe potable water supply.

Residents of Guilford,

2023 was another good year for Guilford-Sangerville Sanitary District (GSSD). District operations went smoothly this year, there is a financial statement that follows. GSSD's effluent discharge was of excellent quality, efficiently treated, and was within Maine DEP license limits throughout the year, continuing our main goal of protecting both the environment and the river.

At the treatment plant, we had over 74.7 million gallons of water get treated and pass through the treatment plant. The treatment plant also continued to operate as a seasonal discharge treatment facility, this year. We did not discharge from mid-July to mid-November (even with all the rain), protecting the river from nutrients.

We have continued our participation in the CDC's National Wastewater Surveillance System (NWSS) program, which involves testing the influent wastewater for Covid-19 and Mpox.

Within the collection system, we had a few road projects in 2023. In Guilford, Pleasant Street, Prospect Street and Morse Avenue were repaved, which required some upper manhole structures to be rebuilt due to age and frost damage. The others were lifted to the new road grade with riser rings.

As of the vote in November we are officially consolidating with the water district to create a new district called the Guilford – Sangerville Utilities District (GSUD). Creating GSUD will be a long and detailed process to both establish the new district and then dissolve both water and sanitary districts. Overall, in the long run this will help us reduce costs and create a more solid district working as one.

The Trustees would like to thank all residents, businesses, and employees for their support and making 2023 another successful year.

To the Citizens of Guilford:

Budget season will be starting soon and the school budget committee will begin working diligently to put forward a budget that provides quality programming while making every effort to be fiscally responsible to our communities. Budget meetings will be scheduled in February and the dates will be posted on our website. We welcome the citizens of Guilford to attend these public meetings.

MSAD #4 relies on revenue from the States Essential Programs and Services (EPS) Funding through the General-Purpose Aid Subsidy (ED 279). The EPS funding formula calculates the cost share of PreK-12 education between the State and Local communities. We receive allocations for special education, transportation and the economically disadvantaged student population. We will receive our preliminary ED 279 report for the 2024-2025 school year in February.

The state and federal COVID grants will end after the 2023-2024 budget year. These funds have made it possible to make upgrades to our HVAC systems and provide interventions for the academic and social/emotional impact of the pandemic on our students.

While we grapple with the increasing costs of maintaining our facilities and providing high quality education to our students, many good things are happening at MSAD #4. Our facilities are in good condition, our staff continue to innovate as the needs of our students change and we are fortunate to have a committed, creative and supportive administrative team. Our PCES Principal, Mrs. Wright was awarded National Distinguished Principal of the Year from Maine for 2023, PCES was ranked #30 in Maine Elementary Schools by U.S. News, and PCMS was ranked #7 in Maine Middle Schools by U.S. News. We are very proud of these accomplishments.

On behalf of the School Board and the school community; I would like to thank the Guilford citizens for all of the support they give to our school. Working together we can continue to meet the educational needs of all students and prepare them to be successful citizens in a rapidly changing world.

The Guilford Historical Society was gifted with many wonderful **donations** in 2023. The donations of time, money and memorabilia have been overwhelming! When a bathroom pipe broke during the extreme cold snap last February and water leaked continuously for over a month, the bathroom floor as well as part of the kitchen/entry floor was ruined. The resulting water bill totaled \$997. Members stepped forward with donations to cover the huge water bill. Floyd Marsh quickly repaired the broken plumbing. Extra precautions have been taken this winter to ensure there are no plumbing concerns. The entryway floor repairs are on the docket for late spring.

Outside areas were improved via donations of **time** by so many resulted in freshened flower gardens, removal of the overgrown bushes in the front and the addition of new mulch. Inside improvements include the creation of a school room in the former office. Reorganization of precious framed photos, inventoried copies of both the GHS Rostrums and PCHS Memorandums as well as school memorabilia has created a bright, cheerful space full of 'blue and gold' history. The freshly painted file cabinet is now available to hold school-related files and the addition of the round table and chairs makes browsing enjoyable. Centered in the room is the old Primary School sign, generously donated by Community Fitness. John Tatko of Sheldon Slate Products was able to repair a small crack in the sign and repainted the gold lettering. Even moving the 900 pound slate sign involved four complete strangers assisting Brian and Paul "PZ" to carefully maneuver the sign into the museum. We are very appreciative of the collaboration of Brittney Gallagher, John Tatko and Jim Wentworth for their donation and efforts to give this piece of Guilford history a new home.

Community activities are often very busy times for our volunteers. While the highlight of the River Festival this year was the large number of Anah Shrine units in the parade, it was made heart-warming to have PCHS Class of 1974 graduate and Sangerville native, Doug Dulac, recognized as the Potentate. Our GHS booth sold hot dogs donated by Guy & Heidi Dow, who tended the grill with the help of Hannah and Eli. It was a very successful day followed by an amazing fireworks show at dusk.

The Harvest Fair was well attended with many new volunteers assisting. Jeff Harrison, head of the Piscataquis Boxing Club, helped cook and serve hot dogs generously donated by John McKusick, enabling us to provide every visitor with a FREE hotdog! The Butler family from Wellington did an amazing job of manning the outside activities, which included face painting, pumpkin painting, chalk drawings, photo booth and balloon animals! Alice Crowley, summer resident at Piper Pond, volunteered to sell our memorabilia to visitors. Thank you to all who donated baked goods and other goodies for sale in the museum. We were visited by Luke Muzzy, President of Greenville Historical Society. GHS members are planning a 'road trip' to a Greenville meeting this spring. While the annual cemetery tour

drew a smaller crowd this year due to the athletic activities at the school, Laurine Goulette provided a very interesting tour.

The number of historical artifacts donated this year has been phenomenal! So many families and organizations have provided bits of Guilford's history to the museum this year. Sadly we do not have an intern from PCHS this year so photographing and inventorying every new donation has not been completed as quickly as in years past. Volunteers are welcome (and necessary) to help with this important record-keeping process.

GHS has the rare opportunity to have all Guilford Registers digitized. This will be a major help to our researchers as they delve into the history of our town. A big thank you to Gretchen Clark, Maine State Library, for all her perseverance in this digital grant process, which may not be complete until 2025.

Our annual newsletter has recently been sent to all members. New this year is the ability to send the newsletter electronically to a large number of our members. We have been fortunate to have Jennifer Heathcote at Puritan handle the printing (again) of our ten page paper edition for snail mail delivery.

Thanks to members, volunteers and others who donated their time and/or financial support to the Guilford Historical Society. Our officers, and their spouses, go above and beyond to keep the museum maintained on a limited budget. A special thank you to the Town of Guilford for your continued support.

In 1909 a Boston Post Cane was sent to 700 selectmen in towns (no cities) in Maine, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and New Hampshire. The canes were all made by J. F. Fradley and Co., a New York manufacturer. Made from ebony shipped in seven-foot lengths from the Congo in Africa, seasoned for six months, cut into cane lengths and turned on lathes to the right thickness, coated and polished. Each cane had a 14-carat gold head two inches long, decorated by hand and a ferruled tip. The head was engraved with the inscription, —Present by the Boston Post to the oldest citizen of (name of town)—"To Be Transmitted". The Board of Selectmen were to be the trustees of the cane and to keep it always in the hands of the oldest citizen.

Over the past ten months I have researched the history of Guilford's Boston Post cane recipients, their longevity and connections to our town. John Wilson Greeley was Guilford's first recipient. He was born in Cumberland in 1825, married at age 22 to Ellen Tuttle, with whom he had three children. The 1880 census has him in Guilford as were his sisters. In 1896 he married Katherine Brown (age 35) when he was 70. He passed away in October 1913.

The longevity of the Cousins family is indicated with Joseph Cousins receiving the Post Cane in 1913, passing in 1915 at age 89. His son, Everett E. Cousins, held the Boston Post Cane for several years, before passing at 89 in 1950. Upon Everett's passing the Post Cane went to his sister, Agnes Cousins French, who held it for a year before passing in 1951 at age 94. She was the first woman to hold the BPC in Guilford.

Another family with multiple cane holders is the Holt family. Eva Clewley Holt held the BPC for two years before passing in 1953 at 93 years old. Forty-seven years later, her daughter, Marian Holt LaBree Brasier would hold the BPC for eight years before passing in 1998 at 105 years of age.

Of the thirty recipients of the BPC, Calvin Bearce was the youngest, receiving the cane when he was a mere eighty-three years young. Marian Brasier held it the longest at eight years. Only four of the holders were born in Guilford. Our current holder, Barbara Ladd Reardon will celebrate her 99th birthday on May 2.

If anyone has any info to add to this "work in progress", I am open to all information including photos.



THE SUN'S OUTER ATMOSPHERE (CALLED THE SOLAR CORONA) GRADUALLY APPEARS GLOWING LIKE A HALO AROUND THE MOON IN FRONT OF IT. BRIGHT STARS AND PLANETS WILL BECOME MORE VISIBLE IN THE SKY. WATCHING A SOLAR ECLIPSE IS A MEMORABLE EXPERIENCE, BUT LOOKING DIRECTLY AT THE SUN CAN SERIOUSLY DAMAGE YOUR EYES. STARING AT THE SUN FOR EVEN A SHORT TIME WITHOUT WEARING THE CORRECT EYE PROTECTION CAN DAMAGE YOUR RETINA PERMANENTLY.

MAINE IS ONE OF THE SELECT STATES THAT WILL WITNESS THE MOON'S PATH COMPLETELY COVERING THE SUN, CREATING MOMENTS OF TOTAL DARKNESS AND A RADIANT RING AROUND THE SUN.

THE START OF THE ECLIPSE WILL OCCUR AROUND 2:19 PM WITH THE TOTAL DARKNESS PHASE BEGINNING AT ABOUT 3:31 PM AND FULL RESTORATION OF THE SUN BY 4:39 PM.

THE NEXT SOLAR ECLIPSE WON'T OCCUR AGAIN IN THE UNITED STATES UNTIL 2044.

This Traveling Memorial stands as a reminder of the great sacrifices made during the Vietnam War. The wall is a 3/5 scale of the Vietnam Memorial in Washington DC, it stands six feet tall at the center and covers almost 300 feet from end to end.

In late October, 2023 Alvin McDonald I and collected the memorial flags that had been placed at the Lawn cemetery and the Elmwood cemetery in Guilford, Maine.

The day was bright and sunny with a brisk wind blowing across the grounds.

When we got there I was amazed at the number of flags displayed.

literally hundreds of flags waving in the breeze.

I was told that the American flags were on the graves of veterans. The other flags that displayed were people who had served on the fire department over the years.

A large number of the sites had both flags placed there. I saw that many of the veterans had also served on the fire Department

After a short explanation of flag etiquette as to the placement of the flags we began collecting them. Most came out easily from the holders others were more difficult as the sticks had warped or swollen.

A couple of the graves also had the Canadian flag placed alongside of the American flag. The reason was that those persons either were naturalized Americans or people with dual citizenship.

The uniquenessof the graves were very interesting. Seeing graves of people who had fought in world wars and even graves of old civil war veterans. Along with the unique designs and extra symbols such as the Masonic logo were very unique.


A very interesting experience unlikely to happen normally.

WARRANT

2024 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

To: Johanna D. Turner, Constable for the **Town of Guilford** in the County of Piscataquis, State of Maine.

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the **Town of Guilford**, in said County, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Piscataquis Community Elementary School in said town, Monday the 18th day of March, 2024 A.D. at 7:00 o'clock in the evening, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

- **Article 1.** To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- **Article 2.** To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

To elect two (2) Selectperson/Assessor/Overseer of the Poor for a three-year term.

To elect two (2) S.A.D. #4 Directors for a three-year term.

To elect three (3) Library Board of Trustees for a three-year term.

Article 3. To see if the town will choose a Budget Committee whose duty it shall be to consider and recommend to the 2025 annual town meeting the appropriations for 2025-2026.

This is an Advisory Committee with authority to make recommendations on the annual budget prepared by the Town Manager and Selectboard.

- Article 4. Shall the town vote, pursuant to 36 M.R.S.A. § 506-A, to fix the date when taxes shall be due and payable and a date when interest is to be charged, to fix the rate of said interest and to set the return interest rate for overpayments resulting from any abatements that may be granted.
- Article 5. Shall the town vote, pursuant to 36 M.R.S.A. § 506-A, to authorize the tax collector to accept the prepayment of taxes not yet committed at no interest thereon?
- Article 6. Shall the town vote to authorize the Selectboard, on behalf of the Town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, at such terms as they deem advisable, including requesting the treasurer to prepare a waiver of foreclosure, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property in accordance with the Town of Guilford Policy for Disposition of Tax Acquired Property?
- Article 7. Shall the town authorize the Selectboard to dispose of surplus or replace personal property and equipment as necessary on such terms as they deem advisable?

- Article 8. Shall the town vote to appropriate from the Overlay those sums which it is obligated to pay for approved tax abatements, including any interest due thereon?
- Article 9. Shall the town vote to authorize the Selectboard, through their agent, to expend payments for payroll and other town services incurred during the time period between February 1st and the annual March Town Meeting of each year?
- Article 10. Shall the town vote to allow the Selectboard, through their agent, to move such sums as may be necessary from designated fund accounts to the general fund for cash flow purposes, returning them once tax collections are sufficient?

This allows the town to continue to operate in the months leading up to tax commitment and before property taxes are received. This saves the town from needing to take out a TAN (tax anticipation note), thus saving the town on legal fees and interest being paid on a note.

Article 11. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$346,311.00 for the operation of the General Government?

Pays for the operation of the town office - personnel, operating costs and supplies. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 12. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,030.00 for election expenses?

Pays for the cost of municipal, school and state elections. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 13. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$97,033.00 for the operation of the Guilford Memorial Library?

Pays for the operation of the library - personnel, operating costs and supplies. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 14. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$103,865.00 for the operation of the Fire/EMS Department?

Pays for the operation of the Fire/EMS Department – personnel, operating costs and supplies. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 15. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$520,395.00 for the operation of the Public Works Department?

Pays for the operation of the Public Works Department – personnel, operating costs and supplies. This includes the maintenance to the public cemeteries and recreational areas. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 16. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,700.00 for the Parks and Recreation areas?

This pays for water, sewer, and miscellaneous maintenance costs. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 17. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 for Street Lights?

The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 18. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$260,000.00 for Contractual Services?

This pays for the solid waste contract. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 19. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for the Planning Board?

Pays board members for their time. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 20. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,630.00 for Animal Control?

Pays for the ACO officer's time and contract with an animal shelter. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 21. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,300.00 for Code Enforcement?

Pays for the officer's time and related expenses. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 22. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,562.00 for the Recreation Department?

Pays for summer children's and fall senior programs. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 23. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 for the town's General Assistance Program?

This is a state-mandated program that assists residents who are in need and found to be income-eligible. A percentage of the amount expensed is reimbursed to the town by the State. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 24. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 to fund the annual Riverfest events?

The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 25. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,350.00 for Charitable Donations?

The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 26. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$115,000.00 for Fire Suppression Fees?

This is a fee required and set by the Public Utilities Commission required to be paid by each taxpayer and is based on the number of hydrants a town owns and maintains. This is a revenue to the Water Department. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 27. Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$202,500.00 to be placed in the following designated Reserve Accounts for future use:

Cemeteries/Parks	\$500.00
Economic Development/Planning	\$20,000.00
Paving\$	125,000.00
Fire Department Capital Reserve	\$7,000.00
Public Works Equipment Reserve.	\$10,000.00

These Reserve Accounts are to be saved and utilized for future improvements to help reduce the burden on taxpayers. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 28. Shall the town vote to accept any and all funds from the State of Maine under the following categories:

These Proposed Revenues are used to help reduce the amount of taxes for each taxpayer. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 29. Shall the town vote to authorize the Selectboard to borrow or appropriate from the Undesignated Fund Balance as they deem advisable to meet unanticipated expenses and emergencies during the year the sum of \$5,000.00?

Allows the Selectboard to meet emergency needs without having to call and incur the expense of a Special Town Meeting. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 30. Shall the town vote to move \$100,000.00 from the Undesignated Fund Balance into the town's economic development capital reserve account?

Allows the use of undesignated fund balance to add to the economic development capital account. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 31. Shall the town vote to use \$25,000.00 from the Undesignated Fund Balance to offset taxation?

Allows the use of undesignated fund balance to offset taxation. The budget committee recommends passing this article.

Article 32. Shall the town vote to repeal their Marijuana Adult Use Ordinance?

Under the recommendation from the town attorney, repealing this ordinance will allow the town time to create an enforceable ordinance as desired. The Planning Board and Selectboard support passing this article. To further clarify opt-in vs opt-out, which was not iterated correctly at the time the original ordinance was passed, please see below information from Maine Municipal Association:

Adult Use

The Adult Use Cannabis Law legalizes cannabis for personal recreational use and establishes a licensing process for commercial cannabis establishments cultivating, processing and selling adult use cannabis. The Law also provides broad home rule authority for regulation of such establishments at the local level. Most importantly for municipalities, the current law prohibits adult-use establishments from operating in any municipality until that municipality has voted to authorize its operation.

Opt-in: The Adult Use Cannabis Act allows municipalities to "opt-in" to the operation of adult use cannabis establishments within their jurisdiction through a vote of the legislative body. Under this "opt-in" process, municipalities are not required to take any action to prevent commercial adult use cannabis activity from occurring in the municipality before the voters decide if and how they want to regulate adult use cannabis in their jurisdiction. All commercial activity is prohibited unless the municipality votes to opt in.

Medical

Since December 13, 2018, municipalities have been allowed to "opt-in" to the operation of commercial medical cannabis establishments – caregiver retail stores, dispensaries, products manufacturing, and testing facilities – through a vote of the legislative body. This means that after December 13, 2018, no new caregiver retail store, manufacturing facility, testing facility, or dispensary may begin operation in a municipality unless or until the municipal legislative body has affirmatively voted to allow that particular type of establishment to be located in the municipality. However, any such facilities already in operation with specific municipal approval prior to December 13, 2018, may continue to operate regardless of whether the municipality votes to opt in.

Article 33. Shall the town vote to authorize the issuance of up to \$1,500,000 in general obligation bonds and/or notes of the Town, the proceeds to be used to finance capital expenditure costs of road improvements in the Town of Guilford and related costs, including the costs of issuance of such bonds and/or notes, with the dates, maturities, denominations, interest rate(s) and other details of the bonds and/or notes, including provisions that may be subject to call for redemption (with or without premium) to be determined by its Treasurer and the Chair of the Select Board?

This is the amount needed to complete a paving project for Sebec Shore Road, Wharff Road, Guilford Center Road and High Street

HELPFUL INFORMATION

DOG LICENSE

All dog licenses expire December 31st. All dogs at the age of 6 months or more, by law need to be licensed, on or before January 1st of each year.

The fee for a male or female dog is \$11

The fee for a spayed or neutered dog is \$6

License Requirements

To license a dog, the owner must provide:

- A current rabies certificate
- Proof and/or a certificate if spayed or neutered
- If moving from another town/city in Maine, bring in current license and a new license will be issued. The cost is \$2
- Licenses are available for renewals and new for the next year on or around October 15th. All dogs must be registered by January 31st of each year. After that date, a \$25.00 per dog late fee applies.

1st Time Licensing

If you are licensing your dog for the 1st time in Maine:

- You must have a current rabies vaccination certification issued by a Maine licensed veterinarian.
- You must have an accurate description of your dog, including your dog's name, breed, sex and color
- You must have a written statement from your veterinarian that clearly states your dog is altered and or / sterile to qualify for the low cost altered license fee.

ELECTIONS

Registering to vote

Proof of residency and proof of identity is required, i.e. driver's license showing physical street address in Guilford; photo identification and document with voter's name and physical address.

Residence for voting purposes as defined in M.R.S.A. Title 21A Sec. 112, is that place where the person has established a fixed and principal home to which the person, whenever temporarily absent, intends to return. Under this definition, residence is something a person establishes, not something a person chooses. While the definition includes the person's "intent to return" to a residence, it makes it clear that the residence must in fact exist, and the person must have established it as a fixed and principal home.

ELECTIONS - CONTINUED

Absentee Ballot Application Request & Procedures

Absentee ballot application requests are available 90 days before election date. Visit the Guilford Town Office to obtain an application, or you may apply electronically through the State of Maine site.

Elections

There are three different elections held annually.

Municipal Election

Municipal Elections are held annually the 3rd Monday in March. At this election you may cast your ballot for the following town officials: Selectboard, school board directors, sanitary district director, library trustees and budget committee members. The meeting is held at 7:00 PM at the P.C.E.S. (formerly, Middle School) cafetorium. This is the Town Meeting where all financial and procedural town matters are decided.

Primary Election

The primary elections are designed to narrow the field of candidates when two or more when the same party are running for the same office. Statewide referendums may also be on the ballot. Polls open at 8am and close at 8pm and are held at the Guilford town offices located at 3 Park St.

General Election

The General Election is the state/federal general election which is held on the Tuesday following the first Monday of November. Polls open at 8am and close at 8pm and are held at the Guilford town offices located at 3 Park St. For more information about registration, statewide referendum & candidates we suggest you visit the Maine Secretary of State's Election Page.

FOOD PANTRY

Additional Food Assistance available at Guilford Economic Partnership Food Pantry located at 84 Elm Street in Guilford. Open the second and fourth Friday of the month 12-3:00 pm. This is not income based.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE

General Assistance is a program that provides assistance for basic needs for eligible applicants who can not provide for themselves and their families. General Assistance provides "a specific amount and type of aid for defined needs during a limited period of time and is not intended to be a continuing "grant-in-aid" or "categorical" welfare program" (4301(5)).

Whoever knowingly and willfully makes any false representation of a material fact to the overseer of any municipality or to the department or its agents for the purpose of causing that or any other person to be granted assistance by the municipality or by the State is ineligible for assistance for a period of 120 days and is guilty of a Class E crime. (4315)

Residents of the town who are having difficulty meeting basic needs such as housing, utilities (electricity and heating fuel), and food may request a General Assistance

HUNTING/FISHING LICENSE

Hunting License

Any Resident, Non-Resident or "Alien" Sportsperson looking to hunt or fish in the State of Maine needs to have a hunting or fishing license and may purchase one online at Maine.gov or by visiting the Guilford Town Office. You will need to provide your name, date of birth, contact information. Also, proof of Hunter Safety or Previous Hunting license number for those purchasing a hunting license.

Lifetime License

Lifetime resident licenses are available in a range of price structures depending upon the age of the applicant. At age 70 many licenses and permits are free. Anyone must obtain a license to hunt wild birds or wild animals. Hunters under the age of 16 must possess a junior hunting license. Hunters 16 years of age and over must possess an adult hunting license to hunt with firearm or muzzleloader. Hunters 16 years of age must possess an archery license to hunt with bow and arrow.

Fishing License

A valid Maine fishing license is required for anyone 16 years of age or older, to fish in inland waters or transport fish taken from inland waters. A person is required to keep his/her fishing license with him/her at all times while fishing or transporting fish and must exhibit their license for inspection by any warden, department employee, guide or landowner upon request.

MARRIAGE LICENSE

Persons wishing to be married in the State of Maine must apply for a marriage license.

Maine residents may apply for a marriage license in the town in which one of them resides. Non-residents may file in any town/city in the State of Maine. Once the intentions are filed and the marriage license is issued, the parties are free to marry anywhere within the State of Maine. I.D. must be provided when filing for a license. Persons previously married, must present certified documents indicating the dissolution of the former marriage.

There is no waiting period for the license to be issued. Both parties must sign the license before it can be issued. The license is then valid for 90 days from the date of issuance.

The fee for a license is \$40.00. Following the ceremony, the license is to be returned to the Guilford Town Office to be filed with the State. Certified copies of the marriage certificate can be obtained for a fee of \$15 for the first one and \$6 for each additional one the same day.

MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS

Renewal Registrations

You will need to provide the following information at the time of your registration renewal:

- * Proof of insurance
- * Previous registration
- * The current mileage of the vehicle

New Registrations

In processing new registrations, the town is authorized to collect sales tax on sales where the tax has not already been paid and process Maine Title Applications for vehicles manufactured in 1998 and newer.

In addition to the required information listed under renewal registrations you will also need:

- The bill of sale or dealer's certificate
- Application for Maine Title
- For a used vehicle (1998 or newer), the previous title
- · For a new (not used) vehicle, the dealer's window sticker

You are welcome to call the town office for a quote on your registration prior to coming in.

NEW RESIDENTS

New Residents

Individuals moving to Guilford from within the state, must, within 10 days, come to the Town Office and have an address change completed on their vehicle registration (no charge).

Individuals moving to Guilford from out of state, must, within 30 days of residency in Guilford, register their vehicles at the Town Office.

You will need to bring:

- · The previous out of state registration
- The title to the vehicle if it is a 1998 or newer model
- · Proof of insurance coverage as required by the State of Maine

PASSPORT

Piscataquis County applicants looking to find a passport office in Maine would need to visit the official US passport acceptance facilities located in Guilford.

The passport agent in Guilford would be able give you the passport form and witness your signature to obtain a passport. Passport acceptance agents at the Piscataquis Offices require an appointment so you will have to stop in ahead of time to the postal office for an appointment.

- Driver's License, State Issued ID, Non-Driver's Identification, Learners Permit, Social Security Card, Marriage License, Baptismal Certificate, High School Yearbook, Voters Registration, Work Identification, Military Identification, Prior U.S. Passport, Tax Records or Utility Bills
- Passport Photo One color photo is required and must comply with the regulations governing passport photos.

PROPERTY TAXES

Wherever you live in Maine and whatever may be the town's fiscal year, the statewide assessment date is April 1st each year. This means that the value taxed is as of that date. For instance, if a building burned to the ground on April 2nd, the taxable value as of the day before would still be taxed and due. The converse is also true....if you placed a brand new home on your land on April 2nd, you would not pay tax on it until the following year.

The fiscal year for the Town of Guilford is February 1—January 31. Tax bills are typically mailed out in July because the rate cannot be set until the school budget has been approved in late June. This creates the strange situation that by the time you receive your tax bill, its already five months late since you are paying for the period from February 1st through January 31st. Bills are then due on receipt and interest begins after August 31st. We do encourage property owners to pay on their bills throughout the year at any amount that is convenient to them. RECREATIONAL VEHICLE REGISTRATION

Maine residents may *renew* an ATV or snowmobile registration online at Maine.gov or at the Guilford Town Office. New registrations must be done at the Guilford Town Office

Nonresidents may register ATVs and snowmobiles online at Maine.gov or at the Guilford Town Office. Boats registrations can be renewed at the Guilford Town Office.

All ATV registrations run from July 1st—June 30th. Registrations before April 30th will expire June 30th of the current year; on or after May 1st will expire June 30th of the following year.

RECREATIONAL VEHICLE REGISTRATION CONTINUED

Boat Registration

All motorboats of any size, including airmobiles and personal watercraft, must be registered in Maine to be used on the waters of this State, except:

Watercraft with valid registration from another state, provided the watercraft registration number is displayed
on the motorboat and the motorboat will not be in Maine over 60 consecutive days after the state of principal
use has been changed.

Fees vary depending on the length, model year, use, and horsepower of the boat (vessel) being registered.

- Up to 10 hp \$30
- 11-50 hp \$35
- 51-115 hp \$41
- 116 hp and up \$49

Boat excise tax is based on the length of the boat.

*There are also clerk fees in the amount of \$5 for a new registration and \$1 for a renewal.

All Boat registrations are valid until December 31st.

For renewals: Boats may be registered online at Maine.gov or at the Guilford Town Office.

TRAILER REGISTRATION

Trailer registrations can be done for one or two years. The registration fees per year are as follows:

- Under 2000 pounds is \$10.50 per year and expires on the same month it is registered.
- Over 2000 pounds is \$21.00 per year and always has a February expiration date.

PLASTIC {Bottles & Jars} - Clean, Remove Covers, Separate Clear from Colored.

<u>CANS</u> -Steel or Aluminum – Clean and Separated {Tin & Steel are magnetic and aluminum is not}. NO Aerosol or Paint Cans.

<u>WHITE OFFICE PAPER</u> – Computer, Copier, Letterhead Paper, and Envelopes (without windows). NO Colored paper or Post It paper.

TRANSIT PLATE

A transit plate is a temporary registration permit for the purpose of moving certain vehicles otherwise required to be registered. A transit plate can be issued for a one-way trip or for a round-trip, depending on the customer's needs. A transit plate is valid for a period up to ten days.

REFERENCE:

Title 29-A, Section 501 (7)

- 7. **Temporary registration permit.** The Secretary of State may issue a temporary registration permit for the purpose of moving certain vehicles otherwise required to be registered as follows.
- A. A temporary registration permit is for one trip only:
- (1) Between the points of origin and destination and intermediate points, as set forth in the permit; or
- (2) From the point of origin to the destination and back to the point of origin, including any intermediate points, as set forth in the permit.
- **B.** A temporary registration permit is for the transit of the vehicle only. The vehicle may not be used for the transportation of passengers or property, for compensation or otherwise, unless specifically authorized on the temporary registration permit. If the vehicle is a chartered bus that is not covered by a reciprocity agreement with the state or country of registration, the Secretary of State may authorize transportation of passengers.
- **C.** The Secretary of State may not issue a temporary registration permit that is valid for longer than 10 days from the effective date of the registration.
- D. The fee for a temporary registration permit issued under paragraph A, subparagraph
- (1) is \$12. The fee for a temporary registration permit issued under paragraph A, subparagraph
- (2) is \$25.

TRANSIT PLATE CONTINUED

- E. The temporary registration permit must be carried in the vehicle at all times.
- **F.** A person who operates or moves a vehicle outside the routes specified in the temporary registration permit commits a traffic infraction and may not be fined less than \$25 nor more than \$200.
- **G.** The Secretary of State may issue unassigned temporary registration permits to a vehicle auction business licensed under section 1051 to allow the movement of a vehicle sold to a dealer.

IMPORTANT THINGS TO KNOW:

- 1. Transit plates are not to be used in lieu of registration or to circumvent the registration requirements. The transit plate may be issued previous to the effective date.
- 2. If an out-of-state resident has had a vehicle registered in another state and wants to transport the vehicle to Maine, we can issue a transit plate to move the vehicle to Maine, even though the vehicle was previously registered to them in another state.
- 3. Verify the vehicle information, VIN, Year, Make and Model.
- 4. Point of origin and/or point of destination must be Maine.
- Insurance must be shown on the vehicle, if the vehicle is to be driven.OR
 - For towing purposes, the permit must state "FOR TOWING PURPOSES ONLY"; insurance is not required in this instance.
- 6. A transit plate can be issued to either the towing vehicle or the unit being towed. A transit plate can be issued on the towing vehicle as long as the unit being towed had a valid registration.
- 7. The motor vehicle must have a valid inspection or a permit to move the vehicle to an inspection station. This permit may be obtained from the Bureau of Motor Vehicles, Municipal Truck Agents, State Police, or local police departments/sheriff's offices.
- 8. If the vehicle being moved was purchased "AS IS WHERE IS" from a dealer, the transit permit may be issued only if the vehicle is uninspected and being moved to an inspection station for inspection.
- 9. The law does not prohibit the transportation of passengers or property, therefore, special permission does not have to be obtained prior to issuing the permit. However, the law does not allow "For-Hire" vehicles to carry a load; such as, passenger/ goods on a transit plate for compensation.
- 10. If the vehicle that is being moved is a mobile home, a statement is required in regards to the taxes, sewer and water having been paid or that none are due. This is done using the MV-47 form. If the customer is from an unorganized territory, they must contact the Maine Revenue Service, Personal Property Tax Section at (207) 287-4785 to obtain the MV-47 form.
- 11. Only one transit plate permit, either a one-way permit or round-trip permit may be issued to a motor vehicle or trailer. Any subsequent moves shall require registration of the vehicle or trailer. Exception: If a one-way permit is purchased and then the customer wishes to move the vehicle "round-trip", we will allow the issuance of a subsequent transit plate for the return trip.
- 12. If the vehicle is being moved through other state jurisdictions, the applicant should verify if that jurisdiction would honor the permit.
- 13. If the vehicle is being moved to Canada-we have confirmed with Canadian motor vehicle officials and the Canadian border patrol that transit plates can be issued for points of destination beyond the border. Therefore, it is not necessary to issue the transit plate only to the Maine border. You may be required to show some proof of ownership at the border; such as, bill of sale. Also, your insurance card should state that your insurance is valid in the United States and Canada. It is not necessary for the insurance card to state for use in the United States and Canada for our purposes of issuing the transit plate, but rather for Canada.
- 14. If you are traveling out of state and you do not have a fuel decal or DOT # issued to you for that vehicle, you may want to check with the states in which you will be traveling.

VITAL RECORDS

Vital Records include birth certificates, death certificates, marriage certificates. Maine's law requires a person requesting a copy of records to provide documentation establishing their direct and legitimate interest in the records.

Individuals who may access vital records include:

- · The person named on the record
- The person's spouse
- The parent(s) of the person named on the record
- · Registrant's legal custodian, guardian or conservator or respective authorized representative
- · Genealogists who have a Maine CDC issued researcher identification card

To obtain a copy of vital records, please come to the town office.

Please make all check payable to the Town of Guilford and also include a stamped, self-addressed return envelope.

Birth Certificates

Birth Certificates may be obtained from the Town of Guilford if the birth parents resided in the Town of Guilford at the time of the birth. The fee for a certified copy of a birth certificate is \$15 for the 1st copy and \$6 for any additional copies obtained at the same time. An application form does need to be complete to obtain a birth certificate.

Marriage Certificates

Individuals who either applied for their license in Guilford and/or were married in Guilford. (If you are not certain of the Place of Marriage, you may call the Office of Vital Statistics for the State of Maine in Augusta at (207) 287-3184). The fee for a certified copy of a marriage certificate is \$15 for the 1st copy and \$6 for any additional copies obtained at the same time. An application form does need to be complete to obtain a Marriage certificate.

Death Certificates

Death Certificates can be obtained from the Town of Guilford if the person resided in Guilford at the time of death or passed away in Guilford. Confidential information on the death certificate, including the cause of death, is available only to person who have a direct legitimate interest in the matter recorded. The fee for a certified copy of a death certificate is \$15 for the 1st copy and \$6 for any additional copies obtained at the same time. An application form does need to be complete to obtain a death certificate.

MISCELLANEOUS THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

Fire Permits

You can get fire permits from the Guilford Town Office Monday through Friday from 8-4. The state fire wardens will allow you to burn during the day if the fire danger is low. Burn permits can be obtained online but permits are not issued before 9 a.m. and you can not get a permit for more than one day at a time.

Cemetery Lots

Purchasing: You may purchase a cemetery lot at the town office. We have the maps and a list of available lots. Each lot, which will hold one casket or 4 cremation urns, is \$200.00. A section consists of 8 lots.

Decorating: You may add decorations as soon as the cemeteries are open after the winter months. Somewhere around Memorial Day. Please remove all decorations by October 15th of each year. If decorations are damaged and blowing around the cemetery, we will dispose of them.

Parking Bans

Beginning November 1st until May 1st of each year the town has a parking ban. Vehicles that are parked on the street during winter plowing season may be towed at the owner's expense if it interferes with snow removal and sanding. If you are unsure where you should park, please contact the Town manager or the road crew. They can be reached through the town office at 876-2202.

Sand for Walkways

Residents of Guilford can go to the town garage located on Blaine Avenue and retrieve 2(two) 5-gallon buckets of sand to be used on their sidewalks and driveways. We do not allow anyone to fill a pickup truck bed with sand.

Streetlights

If you notice a streetlight in town that is out, please call the town office so that we can arrange to have it repaired.
